This year's Wine and Cheese event will be held again at the McQueen's lake home on Saturday, August 1st.


Come early and sip on a Mimosa at the dock and get ready for a fun filled day.

What a Blast It Was

Report on the Fireworks in the nation's capital, July 4, 2009.

In a word, fantastic. Our anchorage in the Potomac just off the National Mall with the Washington Monument tower in full view was nestled in with about two thousand other vessels of various sizes and we were so close to the display site the reports reverberated through the deck of Take Two. Spectacular is not an adequate description, the display just kept coming, continuous streams of rockets bursting into incredible colors, sound so loud you could not talk, like I said, fantastic.

The whole trip was great, the drive to DC on 2 July was uneventful except for traffic and we arrived in the channel off the Gangplank about 7 PM, with plenty of time for anchoring and





dinner. Ramblin Rose and Take Two launched at Pohick Bay, a rather surprising place with very flat bottom and 5 foot of water, lucky we caught the tides just right. Alexandria has the widest no wake zone known to man, half a mile wide and one mile or so long but we were soon through it and marveling at the skyline of the Nation's Capital. Memorials to Lincoln, Jefferson, Washington and the capitol dome were on view as well as the National Cathedral while a steady stream of aircraft arrived and departed Reagan airport. And, of course, the river was well populated with boats.

The anchorage in the channel was well populated as was the Gangplank Marina but not to overflowing and the arrival was easy. When we checked in with the DC Marine Police they were polite and welcoming and the Marina management was on top of everything so everybody was comfortable as we settled in for a couple of days.

Friday and Saturday morning saw folks wandering off to sight see, there was lunch in the National Gallery of



Art, a visit to Air and Space, strolling through the Vietnam, Korea and WWII memorials, mixing into the crowd at four fairs on the mall: Wales, Central America, South America and Africa featuring culture, food and music. A walk to the Safeway, mussels and salmon from the Seafood mar-

ket, some 4th of July flowers and who knows what all filled in the time until old friends Tom and Marbeth Dietrich

arrived to join the Roses, the Barnhills and Rosemary and I to motor out to the river and our fireworks vantage point. While waiting for the evenings highlight fireworks we enjoyed sweet corn and grilled salmon and great company while observing strange boating techniques. Imagine, if you throw an anchor very



far away from a 16 foot runabout with ten people aboard but fail to let out rode or to set it, it will not hold your

boat in a light breeze and moderate current. Another technique was to approach the anchorage, noting that vessels were all aligned with wind and current, then positioning your boat stern against the wind and drop the anchor straight down. This technique worked a little better no doubt due to the 50 foot of chain in the rode. 50 foot was the entire rode let out. Perhaps you have guessed that we all kept a watchful eye and deployed boat hooks and fenders in strategic places.

On Sunday we returned to Pohick Bay, hauled out and journeyed overland to Sandy Point and Annapolis. This time there was a little excitement as in my port side mirror I watched a wheel cross 6 lanes and bounce into

the woods. Turns out it was the left rear from Ramblin Rose's trailer. We were 6 miles from journeys end and we kept on to Sandy Point. On Monday Boat US organized repairs to the tune of \$21.00. Do you know any boaters that do not have unlimited on the water towing and on the road trailer assistance? If yes shun them, make them leave your presence and never darken your helm again.

Annapolis was great, we toured the Academy, rode bikes in the town, had great meals both aboard and on the town, never got out of the harbor to visit the Chesapeake as we were too busy. The Port Annapolis Marina,

located on Back Creek, was the best marina Take Two has ever visited. The personnel, the location, the service, the pool, the facilities, the courtesy van. Wow. On Wednesday at o'dark thirty we headed back to Sandy



Point and loaded up for the trip home. The Roses ventured down route 301 while we, Stevensons and Barnhills, traveled route I95 and stopped at the Marine Corps Museum in Triangle. Brand new, built in 2006, we stayed for about 4 hours. An outstanding tribute to the Marine Corps and our fighting men and women. I will visit again.

Not too miss out on excitement we blew a left front tire in Durham NC. Rosemary was driving and did a fantastic job. The damage was confined to the fender liner and some electrics and with the help of the NC motorist assistance and AAA we were soon back on the road only to discover no trailer lights. An evening at the Holiday Inn in Salisbury, NC followed and we returned home on Thursday with no further incident.

1. Call to Order

A quorum was established with seven members attending virtually as follows: Billy Owens, Charles Guderian, Craig McQueen, Bert Baxter, Chris & Nioka Rose, and Don Woodard.

2. Commander's comments

Billy brought up several items beginning with a request received from National, requesting monetary support from the squadron. This was voted down with a unanimous vote by all bridge members attending. He will join in on the monthly D26 conference call on the evening of June 10th. A discussion ensued concerning a nonmember who has volunteered to assist with boating education. It was decided to invite him to the upcoming happy hour to determine his level of interest in the squadron.

3. Financial issues

Craig gave the balance of 2 CD's being held by TD Bank which together totaled roughly \$5,138 in addition to cash on hand of approximately \$2,600. A discussion followed concerning additional assets which will come to light in more detail after more input from Lynn Solesbee (other CD's) and Rosemary Stevenson (Ladies Auxiliary Assets).

Nioka joined in discussion favoring a Cooper River cruise and a fall color cruise on the Tennessee River both of which are in the planning stages.
